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

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CRONIN'S WOOD SITE SET TO PROVIDE 249 NEW HOMES

large scale residential development at Cronin's Wood brownfield site near Killarney town centre is set to become the largest development to be granted planning permission by Kerry County Council since the scheme's inception in 2021, aligning with the national 'Housing for All' plan.

Meitheal Architects, the award-winning architecture and urban design practice, has announced planning approval for development.

Spanning 7.9 hectares, the development will provide 249 homes, comprising a mix of dwelling houses and maisonettes ranging from one to five bedrooms. This mixture provides for a diverse variety of living arrangements and ensures future adaptability. Cronin's Wood enjoys exceptional local and national connectivity, situated in close proximity to Killarney town with its array of amenities and easy access to major transport networks.

The architectural vision for Cronin's Wood prioritises environmental sensitivity and community integration. By preserving the site's natural contours and incorporating the sloping topography, the plans minimise disruption to the landscape while seamlessly integrating the development into its surroundings. The design ethos emphasises safe, pedestrian-friendly environments with distinct 'homezones' enhancing the character of each residential area.

The group is run by heart patients and carers, its objective is to help


people to return to living as full a life as possible.

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
Simon Coveney T.D. Awards Certificates

to Young Adults with Down Syndrome

Simon Coveney T.D. presented awards at a graduation ceremony at MTU's Department of Tourism & Hospitality on Friday, 12th April, where the first group of students with Down Syndrome in Ireland, along with MTU's BA (Hons) Home Economics and Business students, will be recognised together for their participation in a very unique pilot programme.

This remarkable pilot programme, which commenced in January of this year, came about when Team Up, a Cork-based organisation that works to facilitate inclusion in society for persons with Down Syndrome, approached Dr Noel Murray, Head of Department, Tourism & Hospitality, MTU, with a proposal for a "Team Up for Home Economics and Business

Pilot Programme".



The majority of the students within the Home Economics and Business course plan to go on and become Home Economics secondary school teachers, of which there is currently a great shortage in Ireland, most especially those who have specific special education needs (SEN) experience. Given that up to a quarter of students in any secondary school classroom today have some type of additional need, Dr. Murray saw the value of this initiative for all students involved, most especially those preparing for a career as an educator.

10 years of the Wild Atlantic Way celebrated at Meitheal

THREE MONTH TIME FRAME FOR ROCK ROAD WORKS

The constuction of new footpaths and cycle : lanes at Rock Road will begin on Monday next, April 22nd.

Kerry County Council have said that the works form part of the overall footpath and cycle lane improvements on Rock Road between the Cleeny Roundabout and the Bus and Car Park on Rock Road.

During the works, specific traffic management systems will be in place to facilitate the construction of these works. Every effort will be made to keep the disruption to the absolute minimum, however it should be noted that there may be some delays. The works are

expected to be complete in three months.

A one-way system will be in place on Rock road for the duration of these works. Entry to Rock road from Cleeny roundabout will be prohibited from 8:00am to 6:30pm daily on weekdays from Wednesday, 24 April.

Diversion signage will be in place directing traffic via the Bypass to Lewis road for traffic going into the town centre and via Hans Liebherr road to St Margaret's Road and New Road for Rock road.

All residents and business on Rock road will be contacted in advance of construction works. Kerry County Council are continuing to enhance the public infrastructure in Killarney and wishes to thank members of the public in advance for their patience and cooperation during these essential works.

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

TOURISM MINISTER NEEDS TO GET MORE ASSERTIVE

Minister Catherine Martin visited Meitheal in Killarney last week. She is the tourism minister but it is easy to forget it, she has so many other briefs. Visits to her tourism headquarters in Killarney are too seldom also. She was asked about the strain on businesses and Ms Martin gave out grant figures her new ministerial colleague in enterprise, Mr Burke, was prepared to make available. There was much the same response to a question I posed about the scale of tourism accommodation under government contract in Kerry. Her 'understanding', this time from Minister O'Gorman, was that many Ukrainians were going home. So, the accommodation will be coming back into the sector 'and that is to be welcomed', she said. I am not at all sure how correct that assertion is, actually.

'But did you make the case for your own

sector, have you pressed the case?' I persisted given there is not a single hotel now along the Ring of Kerry as far as Sneem. There was no real reply.

She referred to the 'incredibly generous support for the humanitarian effort'. This reply in a nutshell is the big reason for the distrust that has crept into Irish politics.

And the recent referendum result was a staggering example of how no one any more trusts what is said by politicians left, right or centre, in Government or in opposition. One man, Micheal McDowell defeated that referendum almost single handedly.

The 'incredible generosity' in the refugee response is in reality the Government squandering vast sums of taxpayers' money and over paying accommodation providers, along with spending one million euro a month alone on refugee pets. Minister Martin's delivery was all passive. Someone else was doing something and it will all come about. I may as well have been in a Buddhist meditation session! Where is the active voice?

I have to say as someone of an age who battled for a voice in a male dominated world, I am disappointed with a lot of women in power these days. They are uncomfortable with questions, they will not do live interviews. Flight rather than fight is the mode. I get no sense of assertion. Then there is a confetti of medical certs when the going gets tough. Men would simply not get away with it.

'KON'NICHIWA' TO LEARNING JAPANESE!

The Japanese ambassador on a visit to Kerry called on schools to teach Japanese. It seems at least one school is up for it. Pres Killarney principal Róisín Moore says Japanese is not part of the curriculum in St. Brigid's. But they are currently exploring the possibility of introducing it as a transition year module next year.

Ambassador Norio Maruyama wants primary as well as secondary schools to take up the baton. He was speaking at the sod turning ceremony at the Kerry Technology Park for the new 330 million euro Astellas pharmaceutical plant.

Astellas have been in Killorglin since 1990, he reminded us. Speaking a little Japanese would make the relationship even more sustainable going forward, His Excellency Maruyama said.

Astellas had decided to expand in Kerry because both sides of the marriage - the company and the community - created the atmosphere.

To make this more sustainable would be 'teaching the Japanese language in Kerry.' This included primary and secondary schools and at the third level colleges.

'If you can speak a little bit of Japanese', this would advance the relationship, he told us. Shogun, a drama set in Japan, that gripped me in the 1970s flashed before me and I began to remember the one phrase I learned from it - 'Kon'nichiwa' - which means hello. I have a certain a fascination for that country.

I have long been a follower of their art. Now Japanese language would be an interesting night class, I feel.

There is already a Killarney business connection of course, something pointed out to me by a representative of the Japan-Ireland Chamber of Commerce at the event in Tralee. Killarney's Sarah Hickey is a leading light in business circles and then there is the talented writer Colin O' Sullivan who lives in the north of Japan.

DREAMING OF THE RETURN OF JEANIE JOHNSTON

Speaking of Tourism earlier - the Wild Atlantic Way is hugely celebrated these days, though the kind of over-tourism it is bringing to some places while leaving others bypassed is not something that needs to be addressed.

Over-tourism is hotting up in the Canary Islands these days. We have challenges in Killarney, with overcrowding in some parts of the national park and indeed on the mountains. Minister Martin said 'sustainability at its core' was her outlook on tourism. However there is not much sustainability in bringing thousands of cars and coaches to small roads in west Kerry or to mountains like Carraountoohil and Mangerton coming down with footfall, I feel, and again this needs an active approach.

Tourism is about fashion as much as attractions which do not always stand the test of time. The Jeanie Johnston, a project born here, held great potential once. It sits forlornly on the Liffey these days among the glossy financial centre buildings. There is a link to it from The Irish Emigration Museum, known as EPIC.

I hear that visitor numbers to 'our ship' have increased and although I


sought the numbers repeatedly, I could not get them.

Would it be time to revisit the idea of the Jeanie and bring it back to Kerry? As part of an indoor attraction? Somehow, Blennerville seems a far more natural environment and setting for a Famine ship.

The EPIC museum is well worth a visit, by the way, and is more an experience than a museum. I have one gripe with it: there is no mention of Kerry's St Brendan among the early Irish saints voyaging from Ireland. This might be something to correct.

Donal Looney, James Looney, and His Sister Mary are all very well known in the

Seán, a well known Irish Scholar, was one of the founding members of Gaelscoil Faithleann over 35 years ago. It was the first dedicated Irish Primary School in Killarney, only recently Sean retired as Chairperson of the Board of Management.

Seán was also involved with the Pan Celtic Festival in the late 70's in Killarney, during his tenure in Muckross House, he also worked in the research library. A keen genealogist, gaelgoir, and passionate Dr. Crokes GAA club supporter.

Seán's second family, his fellow guides at Muckross, are going to miss him terribly, together they have met Kings, Queens, diplomats, Politicians, Presidents and world Ambassadors.

THE KENYA EDUCATION PROJECT TABLE QUIZ MAKES A WELCOME RETURN THIS APRIL AFTER A BREAK OF FIVE YEARS.

"So much has happened in the intervening years which disrupted the holding of this long established fundraiser and we are delighted to host it again", Eddie Sheehy from the project told Killarney Outlook.

"Since 2003 the table quiz has been a great reliable source of income for the project, enabling it to support a number of projects in the village of EmbulBul Kenya. The slum village presents so many challenges for its inhabitants on a daily basis but thanks to the generous support the project receives in the Killarney area families are helped and supported in many ways", Eddie added

On a recent visit 70 families from the village received an Easter food parcel consisting of Maize flour, Wheat flour, Rice, Cooking oil, Sugar and Soap. Beds were also supplied to a number of needy families as well as clothes from friends in Fossa.

At present 76 students are sponsored in the primary and secondary school and some funding has been set aside already for sponsorships in 2025. Funding has also been provided to a few students attending boarding school, colleges of further education and a health care course. Ten girls living in a hostel on the grounds of the school are helped with the provision of hygiene and sanitary products ensuring full attendance at school.

Support of the village feeding programme ensures that 60 children and teenagers receive a hot meal each evening after school.

None of these commitments could be sustained without the generous support of so many people in the Killarney area, schools individuals and groups who believe in the work of the project each year and whose support is unfailing and generous. This wonderful support is a huge boost and encourages us to sustain our efforts to help people who have so little.

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
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Plan your strategy for the weeks leading up to the State Exams

IME MANAGEMENT

As exam candidates attend school for the final term before the State Exams begin on the 5h June, they have already done a fair amount of work. Many exam candidates have worked diligently and consistently throughout the year. Others may have been less focussed and motivated as they travelled the road to next June's exams. But the fact remains that every exam candidate has a foundation of work, however solid or precarious, on which to build over the next few weeks. Efficient and careful use of the remaining time will be enough to get you safely over the finish line. No matter how little work you have done to date, you can still achieve a worthwhile result in your exam if you put your best effort into the final few weeks. It's also important to appreciate that you know a great deal more than you give yourself credit for.

SMART GOALS

The immediate priority now is to reassess your goals and make a plan of action for the run into the exam. The time for procrastination has well and truly passed. It's essential to have clear goals and an action plan to help you to be successful. If you are to achieve your academic goals, they will have to be SMART – specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and timelined. Your focus must now be on your total readiness for next June's exams. Avail of all the help that is at your disposal during the next few weeks to ensure that you are in tip top shape for the challenge of the exams.

ATTEND

The subject teacher at school, who after all is the expert, will guide you through the last few weeks in revision, exam techniques and overall subject strategy. Attend school regularly during the final term and maintain a diligent work schedule to give yourself every possible chance of achieving your goals. Be clear in your own mind as to what exactly your goals are. Have confidence in your ability to achieve them. Have a plan to accomplish your aim

and, critically, execute your plan by doing the necessary work.

REVIEW

Carry out an honest review of your exam programme straight away. Make a decision about the level – higher, ordinary or foundation - of the paper you will answer in each subject. Set down a target grade in each subject. Convert each grade to CAO points and add up your six best scores. Now you have a target grade in each subject and an overall points' target to help motivate you. It's vital at this late stage to set realistic goals. For example, if you feel you may not be able for a higher-level paper in a particular subject, are you not far better off taking an ordinary level paper in that subject where you may achieve a decent grade? Consider what you would like to do after the Leaving Cert exam. A singular determination to achieve enough points to get a place in your course of interest is a great motivator. Perhaps, your primary motivator should be to do yourself iustice in the exam and to achieve results that reward your ability and effort. Having clear and focussed goals will make your last term more productive and rewarding.

CHALLENGE

Regard the next few weeks and the actual exam as a challenge that you will meet headlong and with determination. Approach it with confidence and belief in yourself. Take total control of your life and channel your energy in a positive direction. Every time you have a doubt or a negative thought about yourself replace it with a positive one. You will feel better about yourself if you are in control of your situation. To assume that control set aside some time to make out a plan of action. Decide what topics you need to revise between now and the exam. Make out an overall time schedule, a weekly schedule and a daily schedule. Make out that plan of action over the next few days so that you will hit the ground running.



KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

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






Is your neck showing your age?

This 92-year-old woman had been applying sunscreen to her face daily for over 40 years but did not apply it on her neck. Her neck is now visibly older looking from sun damage with thicker, wrinkled, discoloured skin.

To prevent this happening to you apply your SPF daily to all exposed areas your face, neck and hands. Then reapply every 2 hours when outside. If you are prone to "Red Neck" in the sun you can wear a neck gaiter with SPF 50 built in. Specific neck creams can stimulate more collagen and elastin production here to prevent aging but if your skin regime contains active ingredients like retinol and lactic acid this will work. The skin on your neck is more sensitive and thinner than your face so begin



with a lower concentration of active ingredients here to prevent a reaction. Use gentle upwards strokes when applying creams to your neck. Start treating your neck like an extension of your face using your cleansers, serums, moisturiser and masks on your neck too.

Tips to lose one stone

More daily movement, by adding more steps to our day over a consistent period this will help aid us along with the following tips to lose weight. By tracking our food, we are more alert to what is going into our body daily, keep a diary of what foods and what time we are eating. Measure your weight weekly by stepping on the scales or by doing measurements is always a good indicator to how we are progressing. By adding in some cardio exercise such as walking, jogging, rowing and by doing some resistance work moderately by doing some weight training all these contribute well to losing weight. Can we eat more unprocessed foods, fruit and vegetable. Create a calorie deficient for example if our daily calorie intake is 2000 try aim form 1800 and over a period of time this will help us lose weight. Aim for 1lb a week and after 14 weeks there's your stone.

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PRESBYOPIA

What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an age-related process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading

Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want:

to wear glasses.

Are there exercises I can do to stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing glasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years.

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop

For any vision changes it is important to have a sight test to determine the cause.







When assessing the merits of this game it would be important to remember that in the case of Utility Trust St Pauls it was all about applying the cherry to the icing on top of the cake. With the ultimate box of promotion to the Superleague ticked, it would have been a wonderful apperitif to complement a feast of a season but unfortunately on this occasion Swords Thunder allied a ravenous hunger with a well executed game plan to carry the spoils.

Thats not to say that St Pauls weren't up for the clash but its safe to say the harder they tried the worse it got for them. Like all champions they fought till the bitter end, relying on a winners instinct, but unfortunately the ball decided to bounce the other way, more often than not into the hands of a grateful Swords outfit. The victory was built around the terrific trio of game MVP Jensen Caretti, Jasmine Walker and Peggy Black who applied the fatal wounds at various stages.

One feature of St Pauls league triumph in March was the fast start, but this was denied to them on this occasion by the hot hands of the aforementioned trio. Sofia Paska, Denise Dunlea and Khiarica Rasheed had got their side up and running and midway through the first quarter it was 12-11 in St Pauls favour. Dunlea in particular had made an impressive start but that was pockmarked by early foul trouble, a feature of the first half. They may have felt aggrieved by some of the calls but Paska made sure parity was maintained at the end of the opening period. The second quarter opened in similar fashion with Paska particularly impressive and when Dunlea hit a brace of baskets it looked like St Pauls were starting to dominate. Rasheed kept that vibe going to open up a 27-20 lead midway through but Aisling O Sullivan, in her career swansong, hit a couple of threes , sandwiching a Walker special. to pull level. An unsportsmanlike foul looked like being the spur for another rally but Caretti was imperious at both ends and she helped to share the spoils at half time, 34 a piece.

Early free throws from Lorraine Scanlon gave James Flemings side an early leg up but Swords were starting to heat up, combining solid defence with unerring accuracy. Megan Howe climbed off the bench to hit a big three but Rheanne O Shea went coast to coast for a superb reply. Megan Connolly supplemented efforts from Walker and Black to push the lead out to 10, 54-44 but Dunlea had the last word of the quarter, cutting the gap to seven, at three quarters stage.

Rasheed and O Shea seemed to have the engines purring at the onset of the final period, their efforts putting St Pauls ahead, for what seemed like the first time in an age. All evening Coach Fleming had shuffled his deck in an attempt to garner winning momentum with Leah McMahon and Meabh Barry doing their utmost but the wind was definitely in Swords sails as Black, Howe and Caretti set for home. Paska tried to carry the load inside, even cutting the gap to two inside the final minutes but Laura Fortune and Walker applied the finishing touches to a scoreline that saw Swords six clear at its end. 69-63.

Khiarica Rasheed top scored for St Pauls with 19, closely folllowed by Paska with 16 and Dunlea with 14. Rheanne O Shea had 10, Lorraine Scanlon 3 and Lynn Jones 1.

For Swords the terrible trio of Caretti, Walker and Black combined for 49 points, complimented by Aisling O Sullivan on 6 and Laura Fortune on 5.

Speaking post game Coach James Fleming and Joint captains Rheanne O'Shea and Lynn Jones were unanimous in the thought that defeat on the day shouldn't overshadow a season's work. O Shea was full of praise for Swords. "They hot some massive shots, they are a good team with two great Americans. It was nip and tuck all the way but I suppose after a long season it was just a case of going to the well once too often".

Coach Fleming was glowing in the praise of his squad. "I couldn't be prouder of them, they are a great team. Six weeks ago we were on cloud nine after winning promotion so I suppose you could say were on cloud eight now. This won't overshadow what has been a magnificent season for everyone ".

Jones , in the autumn of her career , felt the long season took its toll. "We just felt a little bit flat after a long year, there wasn't much gas left in the tank at the end. Of course we wanted to win today but we've had a great season and we can't lose sight of that".



RE-TURN SCHEME USE NOT SUITABLE FOR THE DISABLED

The Government and the DRS trading as Re-turn who was employed by the Minister, gave no consideration to people with disabilities when designing and implementing the bottles and cans return machines, Councillor Marie Moloney has said.

Wheelchair users cannot access the slot for inserting the bottles and cans as it is too high and out of their reach. This was total negligence on behalf of Re-turn and indeed Minister Smyth who should have issued a directive to make provision for people with disabilities. Not only are wheelchair user precluded from using the deposit return machines but people with impaired vision also have difficulties in operating the machines as there is no braille marking on the machines.

Many people with disabilities are very independent and lead independent lives and returning their used cans and bottles should not be an obstacle for them. They should not be forced to ask for help at these machines.



Likewise, people with impaired vision should not be put in a position to have to ask someone to operate the machine for them.

People with disabilities should be provided with all necessary means to enable them to lead a normal independent life and our Government has failed them miserably on this occasion.

FUNDING FOR SENSORY AREAS REQUESTED



Cllr. John O'Donoghue has raised the following at the recent meeting of Kerry County Council.

He has asked that the council would, where requested, support any groups in our towns and villages wishing to set up sensory areas under any suitable funding mechanisms that become available. This would serve the colossal benefit of making our public amenities more accessible to all".

Accessibility to all aspects of society is a major issue for some and I feel we as a Council should lead the way in doing all we can to ensure all citizens of our State have equal rights. I am very fortunate to be a small part of a wonderful group working to make Killarney Autism Friendly to ensure those with additional sensory needs are catered for in our town. Many towns around the country have sensory areas in their playgrounds, and I am aware of the good work done here in Tralee by some of my colleagues here in the Town Park in this respect. The reports from these Towns with sensory areas in their playgrounds from the users is one of gratitude that their child can access the areas like all the other children. No child in this State should ever have to feel grateful for simply being facilitated to access the same level of care or services as their peers, but the point still stands in that it shows the importance of what great things can be achieved by relatively small steps on our part. I ask that the Council would look favourably upon any request for assistance, be it financial or otherwise, if any groups come to them looking for it. Bunreacht na hÉireann details the rights of each child in the State to non discrimination and we must do all we can to facilitate this noble ideal.

CLLR. HEALY RAE CALLS FOR COUNCIL TO AMEND DEVELOPMENT PLAN

At the April meeting of Kerry County Council, Maura Healy Rae tabled a motion to call on the council to amend the County development plan to enable more planning permissions to be granted.

"Under Section 13.1 A of the Planning and Development Act 2000, I request that the Chief Executive complete a report to amend the County Development Plan, in order to support people in being able to seek and acquire planning permission that the areas considered to be under significant urban pressure need to be reduced as they are far too expansive as it stands, particularly in the Killarney Municipal District."

The areas affected by this planning policy in the Killarney Municipal District include, Barraduff, Fossa, Killarney, Rathmore, Beaufort, Headford, Kilcummin, Tiernaboul, Muckross and Lissivigeen. This in essence is the vast majority of the district leaving tracts of land sterilised given the impossibility to acquire planning permission.

The major difficulty for people in these areas is they will not be considered for planning unless they are a farmer's son or daughter or preferred niece or nephew. While I welcome provisions for farming families, I believe local people who could potentially buy a site in their area, should also be considered favourably for planning permission.

In order to progress the process to amend the county development plan and reduce the areas under this restriction, I needed to get the support of three quarters of the elected members, meaning I would need 24 councillors to vote for my motion. Twenty councillors voted for the motion, one voted against and eight councillors were absent. While I thank the councillors that supported my motion, I am disappointed with the result as another



UNCONVINCING KERRY DISMISS LISTLESS CLARE CHALLENGE

Munster U20 Championship Kerry 1-13 Clare 0-5

Kerry won their opening game in this year's U20 Munster Championship, and won it well. Not necessarily convincingly, in that there were some worrying discrepancies in Kerry's overall play, particularly in the second quarter, but at the same time by a triple score margin. Again, that has to come with a caveat. I'm sorry, but Clare never really emerged from their shell to make a real game of it. I wouldn't be too harsh on them for not scoring in the second half -I'm not sure how many people realise what an absolute gale force of a wind that was - but to play thirteen men at the back in the first half when they had that wind at their backs? Look, I'm not arguing that underdogs are best advised to cry havoc and let slip the dogs of war, but you have to attack some little bit, nd Clare didn't.

Cormac Dillon opened the scoring after great work by Tomás Kennedy. Kerry lorded early possession, but I thought lads were looking to pass it when they were in decent shooting positions themselves - to be fair, I hadn't copped exactly how strong that wind was to play against. In fact, I was grumbling a bit when Evan Boyle fisted a pass over the defender, feeling that he could nearly have fisted it over the bar from there. Which shows you what I know, because Charlie Keating had timed his move into the square perfectly and Boyle had seen what I had not. The Crokes man neatly dinked it home - for me, Keating was Kerry's man of the match. I thought he covered every inch of ground, and I was especially impressed by his off the ball work in closing down options for Clare.

My overall man of the match would have gone to Joshua Moloney, Clare's wing back. It's a lot harder to look good in a team that is losing out in the vast majority of duels, but Moloney showed pace, drive, and hunger. Clare's plan, obviously, was bursting from deep and this guy was masterful at it. He won a free for Clare's Darren Keane to open their account. Cormac Dillon coolly notched his second from play, but Moloney promptly won another free for Keane to make it 1-2 to 0-2.

Then things got a lot more worrying for Kerry. Conor Fennell clipped over a point. They won the kick-out and Tom Curran made it a one point margin. Kerry were actually winning a fair amount of possession, but trying to force things. Running into tackles, over-carrying.... little things, but ultimately, champions get those little things right and we simply weren't. A Daire Culligan free made it 1-2 to 0-5 at half-time.

Fair enough, no Kerry supporter was remotely worried, not with the wind advantage in the second half. Kerry brought on Luke Crowley at half-time, and he absolutely stormed into the game, booting a loose ball straight over the bar. Kerry in front. Cormac Dillon doubled our advantage. Rob Stack, the captain, put in a huge shift around the middle (he did hold the ball too long once or twice, but he was winning a lot of that ball himself, made it three points between them. The truth is that this contest was visibly dying a death, Clare could make no headway against that wind.

There is no point or need to go through the rest score for score. Kerry, without ever looking brilliant, were able to pick off scores and Clare hardly got off a decent scoring attempt. One interesting feature was the performance of the Kerry subs, every one of whom impressed. Ian O'Sullivan and Luke Crowley would always be on my starting fifteen and Paddy Lane, despite just coming out from minor (the same as Kirby, Boyle, and Kennedy) would have been very strongly in contention for me. Now, for all I know, lads might have been carrying knocks, or Tomás Ó Sé might not have wanted to show his full hand against Cork.

Right now, it's a case of job done, but a steeper road ahead. Or, to paraphrase from a 2002 political slogan, "a lot done, more to do".

THE SEARCH FOR SAM

Dublin versus Meath. One of the hottest rivalries in gaelic games. The famous four game saga of 1991 has gone down in legend, having reclaimed Irish supporters allegiance after they had been lured away by the Irish soccer in Italia '90. That never actually happened, by the by. GAA attendances were already growing, and most of those GAA supporters also supported



Irish soccer, rugby....the idea of it being one or the other or even that either of those events precipitated the Celtic Tiger....

The Royals versus the Jacks has a much older history, and one that always and ever had bite behind it. An interesting thing about "Dublin: The Game of My Life" by David Sheehan, a series of interviews with Dublin players down through the years (as much as I admire David Byrne's "Kerry: The Game of My Life", the Dubs have a candour, humour, and occasional flash of regret that makes it the best of the genre, in my opinion) is the amount of times that they single out games against Meath as their most memorable. We in Kerry claim Cork as our nearest rivals (the numbers do not back that up) and Dublin as our greatest. But in Dublin, you measured yourself against Meath. Anything else was a bonus. And once upon a time the reverse was also true, but the Royals have fallen far down the pecking order (I myself feel that the decline started when they removed Seán Boylan as manager by back door channels).

Some 21,445 was the recorded attendance for the Leinster quarter-final clash between Dublin and Meath. And that's more than I actually expected, until I realised that the figure includes the attendees at the Derry v Westmeath and Tipperary v Galway Very National League Camogie Finals. Galway in particular had big support, many of whom departed rather than stay for the Dublin Meath game.

Quite honestly, if Kerry had been in one of those camogie finals, I'd have been hitting the road back to Kerry early as well. Why waste time watching a foregone conclusion? And we all knew that it was a foregone conclusion. At the start of this year, Dublin were 13/8 to win the Sam Maguire. Not the Delaney Cup, the Sam Maguire. God be with the days when you had Colm O'Rourke, Liam Hayes (the greatest pantomime villain of that era), Liam Hayes, John McDermott, Colm Coyle (personally, I'd have taken my chances with Hayes long before Coyle!), Brian Stafford....Martin O'Connell may actually have been the best of them. Go to a later vintage and the likes of Giles, Geraghty, McDermott, Fay.....they never stepped back against Dublin! Go earlier. Boiler McGuinness. Paddy 'Hands' O'Brien. Jack Quinn. Peter McDermott, 'the man in the cap', some people

(me) would say he was the greatest of them all. Meath didn't shame themselves last Sunday. Far from it. They actually made a great start and had Dublin ducking on the ropes a bit. Defensive football, good pressure on Dublin kick-outs, and some good scores. But Dublin calmly absorbed the punches and gradually but inexorably began to pick them off. Mannion got man of the match but I didn't think there was any real standout performer; they were just that little bit better every time that it counted. You can argue that Bugler's goal - argue about steps if you wanted, but that was executed perfectly from Dublin's own full back line - opened the floodgates, but it had an inevitability about it all long before that. Once upon a time Croke Park was absolutely bursting at the seams for games like these. Go back to the early fifties, and I literally mean bursting at the seams; it was actually dangerous. Nowadays? Why on earth did 21,000 go to see this?

What will the attendance be for Kerry v Cork this weekend? I note (as of Tuesday morning) that ticketmaster is already out of stand tickets. With the weather these days (I know the forecast is decent) I'm not standing on the terrace. Granted, the Ladies game against Tipperary should be interesting (I'm not expecting any surprise there either, to be honest), but I have a sneaky suspicion that stand tickets will mysteriously be appearing towards the end of the week.

Having the game behind a paywall on GAAGO will help boost the attendance slightly, but reduce overall interest. That's the thing about paywalls. It takes you out of general conversation and costs your sport in the long term in terms of public interest. It's a lot harder to engage hearts and minds if you don't engage casual viewers. Away back in 1962, when RTE first began broadcasting games, the GAA had strong fears that nobody would go to the games if they could watch them on TV. It turned out to be the exact opposite, as public interest saw attendances grow. Every sport that I have ever heard of worldwide has noticed the same thing. The blunt fact is that people want to see the events that are a part of the public consciousness. When it becomes difficult for them to so, those events drift out of the public consciousness.

Guess at what four Connaught teams are in the semi-finals. Yep, Galway, Mayo, Roscommon, and Sligo. Galway had a tough enough league campaign, with injuries certainly not helping them, and veered close enough to a relegation battle. Galway have yet to repeat the heroics of their 2022 campaign, but there is talent to burn. Mayo must be favourites for Connaught. Yet again, they have somehow rebuilt a team practically from scratch and are still genuine All Ireland contenders - I invite doubters to remember the lesson they handed us on our home ground last year. Roscommon will put up a good battle, they always do, but I just don't see the scoring power. Sligo....hard to read. Good underage development in recent years, but how soon if ever will it translate?

So...Kerry in Munster (I'll always fear Cork a little bit and they have improved a lot, but I still

think they have a way to go), Dublin in Leinster (surprise!) and probably Mayo but maybe Galway in Connaught.

Ulster? The big guns are only limbering up at the moment. I realise I'm tempting fate enormously, but I don't see Donegal, despite their impressive parsmony having the sharpshooters for the top. Derry have been phenomenal so far but I'm not convinced that they, particularly the Watty Grahams the Glen lads, could emerge from a gruelling Ulster campaign with enough left in the tank. Tyrone definitely have the forwards...if they have the courage to use them. Glenn Ryan has had a tough tenure so far, with a talented Kildare somehow unable to keep focus for a full game (not the first Kildare team in history about which that has been said). Even so, they were expected to see off Oisín McConville's Wicklow with a bit

They lived on luck in those last few minutes and it was gripping. Remember hwo brilliant the TV commentary was?

You don't. Because it wasn't on TV.

I love gaelic football. Granted, I'd always care more about my club than my county – there is no right or wrong there; that's just my personal choice. There's county league this weekend. I may be humming and hawing about the Kerry v Cork game, but I won't be missing the county league game the day before. Most teams are badly depleted at the money. Most pitches are in dire conditions. But those games matter.

The search for Sam? Don't even call me until it gets down to the last eight, last twelve if we are in that knock-out round (and I personally believe that extra week is a colossal burden on teams with real ambitions of winning it out).

SOCCER HILL STEPS DOWN



Jonathan Hill's departure as CEO of the FAI wasn't exactly the newsflash we were expecting. Well, given their recent record, I think the majority of us were extremely sceptical of the promise to announce a new Senior Mens' manager this week, given the fact that almost all of the mooted candidates were running as fast as they could from the job, and weren't really expecting any announcement. That appointment was mishandled from day one and it has become a huge rod for the FAI's back.

To be honest, so has Jonathan Hill's tenure as CEO. The misfeasance in regards to his salary was the deal-breaker as far as public opinion was concerned. And I'm not downplaying that, not even a little bit. Hill was meant to be the new broom that would sweep the lingering smell of John Delaney's colossal failure out of Abbottstown. So this happening with your salary under your tenure....poof! There goes all of your credibility. And that's not so important to the likes of me. But when you are simultaneously asking the Irish Government for over half a billion (yes, that's the one spelt with a 'b') euro....a lot of FAI officers have always been considered dinosaurs by people actually working on the ground, but that lad is most definitely a bronntosaurus with that much neck.

The fact that he was essentially treating the role as a part-time job, travelling from his England home a few days a week rather than fulfilling his promise to base himself in Ireland, was given a free pass for a long time, but I guarantee you that most soccer journalists in the country had their pencils sharpened long before they actually wrote about it. Delaney was actually a master of smooching with the grassroots, and those grassroots, in Kerry as well as elsewhere, lapped it up.

In actual fact, the absolute, unquestioned dealbreaker for me, was actually shafting his own staff on pay while doing so. Literally doing the exact opposite with their salaries as his own. 'Ave, duce nova, similis duce Seneca!' Which means "meet the new boss, same as the old boss". In my opinion, you could take it away from the flame at that point, because that toast was ready.

The FAI did eventually get a sponsor after several years without one, which was the raison d'etre for appointing Hill in the first place, but even their own response was surprisingly

muted some extremely, extremely embarrassing appearances in front of the PAC Committee (the cover-up of Hill's pay was so truly awfully mismanaged I actually think even John Delaney would have been embarrassed) didn't help.

Lastly, Hill was always up against an old guard of the FAI, who had been left in place because "you need soccer people to run a soccer organisation" (it has been fairly self-evident for over a century that in this country at least, you need the exact opposite kind of people). Quite simply, a lot of former Delaney supporters were and still are old cobwebs that didn't really want a new broom.

Look, his tenure could only be described as 'glowing' if you were comparing it to thermonuclear waste, but I'll wish no ill of the man. The guestion would seem to be who replaces him? I'll put a better question, and it's the same one I've been saying about the managerial role. Who would actually want the job?

LOI DIVISION ONE Treaty United 0 Kerry FC 0

Despite the victories in the Munster Senior Cup and the League of Ireland win over Longford Town, this might actually have been Kerry FC's best performance so far this year. Treaty United made a great start to the year (to be honest, I'd read almost nothing into that Munster Senior Cup 4-1 win; neither Treaty nor Cork City threw any handle with the hatchet in those games). The Limerick side have hit a bit of a slump in their last couple of games, but that's a team not too much older than ourselves (although, of course, the reality is that they are at least a linear descendant of Limerick FC) and they seem to do their business right both on and off the field. In short, I considered this a very tough test and a real chance to stamp out credentials.

Things looked ominous right in the first minute as Treaty got in a really beautifully measured cross that beat the defence - forgiveable, given the quality of the ball – and Mark Byrne rattled the woodwork. Despite catching the volley well, I genuinely thought that he should have tucked that away.

I liked Kerry's response. A team who looked like they could be rattled last season by such things just tore straight into the game. Just five minutes later Ryan Kelliher carved open a chance for himself and hit a good shot that was blocked. I especially liked the confidence that saw him go for it; that spoke volumes about Kerry's attitude to me.

Chances were coming thick and thin. Either side could have scored two goals before half-time. In fact, neither did, and maybe the execution wasn't quite at the top level. It's no criticism when I say that the difference between Division One and the Premier is the conversion of chances like that. 0-0 at the break, but by this stage, nobody expected it to finish that way.

Once again, both sides had great chances early in the second half. Steven Healy had a good effort saved, while Antonia Tuta made a great save himself. In fairness, Treaty's Corey Chambers was the busier of the two keepers neither could relax for a second, such was the pace and intensity. Kerry could consider themselves unlucky when Ronan Teahgan's rocket crashed back off the crossbar. Kerry gradually took control of the general play and probably had the best chance of the game when Chambers was forced to spill a Cian Brosnan piledriver. The ball fell to Daniel Okwute, but you have to credit the goalkeeper. The first save was quality, but the second one really was top class.

In the end, the game finished scoreless, and Kerry would be the more disappointed side. Given that I genuinely rate Treaty and I think they will be there or thereabouts at the season (I presume everybody knows who will be taking the automatic promotion spot. You'd get better odds on Man City winning the Premiership, and I've considered that a sure thing all season as well), I really think this must count as another significant step forward. I know that it's a very bad long-term habit to celebrate draws (a 50% win/loss ratio is better than a 100% of draws) but this one is an exception.

By the time you are reading this, Kerry FC will be preparing to face Athlone Town in Mounthawk Park. They are just three points ahead of us. Certainly, not easy, but doable. Here's hoping! 


Bringing it all back home

SUMMER BEDDING

Its that time of year again when we think of putting colour in our pots, baskets and containers and also in the ground. With some good weather



hopefully on the horizon, it's definitely one for your ist of jobs in the garden. Summer Bedding plants can be used very effectively in the ground for filling gaps between shrubs or border perennial plants as they can cover a lot of ground and add plenty of colour very quickly. When planting Summer bedding plants in the ground the first thing you have to do is to dig over the area and dig in plenty of compost. Most Summer Bedding plants need a nice sunny sheltered position but if you have a shaded area, begonias are excellent bedding plants for this situation and they will give you flowers right through the summer and into early autumn. As an added bonus they will also provide you with excellent coloured foliage from light green to dark purple. Always remember when planting bedding to put the taller ones at the back. If you want to do a summer display of bedding on its own in a bed you will have to choose a centre piece - a good plant for this would be a standard fuschia. Then start with the tallest, such as marigolds or antirrhinums and work your way out to the edge of the bed with some begonias or petunias and finally at the edge of the bed with some lobelia and alyssum. A good idea before you plant would be to position all your plants to get an overall view of what it will look like. And remember to water all plants well in afterwards.

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
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
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


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

Later, when Judas tried to slag off Mary's opulent gift to Jesus as she washed His feet with her tears and poured expensive oil over His head, Jesus rebuked Judas - saying that what she had done was in preparation for His impending death (John 12:3-8; Mark 14:1-9). Mary's ministry to Jesus as His darkest hour approached is remembered forever, for all the right reasons. What Judas did to Jesus is also remembered forever - for the complete opposite reason. One beautiful thing that resulted from Mary's act was that after she finished pouring the oil upon Him, she smelled just like Jesus, and

Being in God's Presence does that — it affects everything about you. The Word says that we bring a fragrance from the Presence of God within us — a beautiful scent of Life to those who receive Him, or the smell of death to those who are perishing (2 Corinthians 2:14-17). God wants no one to perish. He desires that all men be saved and come to the knowledge of Him (1 Timothy 2:4). Where Salvation occurs is here on this earth – today. Don't put it off for another time. God is calling out to you – so answer His knock upon the door of your life before it's too late! Repent of sin and ask the Lord Jesus to come into your heart – give Him your life and get to know Him through His Word.

Praying is just talking to God. A good way of knowing when we come into His Presence is when we become aware of how sinful we are. This happened to Isaiah when he saw a vision of The Throne Room in Heaven. This man - who loved God, and was used by Him to prophesy His Word, felt the full weight of the dirt of his human flesh, and begged God for mercy. "Then I said — it's all over! I am doomed, for I am a sinful man. I have filthy lips and I live among a people with filthy lips. Yet I have seen the King, the Lord of Heaven's Armies" (Isaiah 6:5 NLT). Isaiah got a glimpse of God's Salvation and the cleansing fire of His Love, and that same Love is there for you too dear friend. May the Lord bless and protect you always x




